MINISTRY REPORTS

WORSHIP AT CALVARY

WORSHIP SERVICES AT CALVARY

Worship continued this year at 8:00, 9:15, and 11:00, in a variety of liturgical styles. We were able to offer the 11:00 service online.

WORSHIP MINISTRIES AT CALVARY

It was a joy to fully return to worship after over a year and a half of pandemic restrictions.

Worship Ministries fully resumed, and we are grateful for the Readers, Chalice Bearers, Acolytes, Ushers and Greeters, Choir, and Altar Guild. Chalice Bearers added several new members to their ministry, and we went from serving one chalice to two on Sunday mornings at the 11:00 service.

Attendance, when taking into account Online Worshipers, is at pre-pandemic levels.

ACOLYTES

We are especially pleased to have commissioned several new Youth Acolytes at Calvary. We went from one Crucifer position to adding two torchbearers to the Altar Party each week. A special thank you to Suzanne Berger for taking on the role of Acolyte Scheduler. Your encouraging presence each week makes a difference to our young people and their role in worship.

FEAST DAYS & HOLIDAYS AT CALVARY

Holy Week 2022 offered the chance to experience the story of Jesus' passion and resurrection in powerful ways as we gathered in person once again, with the offering of Stations of the Cross for Ukraine, the return of the Good Friday Service, and the overnight Prayer Vigil from Maundy Thursday to Good Friday at Noon, and the Easter Egg Hunt as highlights.

Pentecost and the Feast of the Holy Cross joyfully bookended the summer months in Ordinary Time as traditional days we celebrated major feasts as one community.

Christmas this year featured a robust pageant at 5:00 and wonderful choral music at 9:00 with over 200 people making it out for worship despite blizzard-level snow!

WORSHIP AT CALVARY

9:15 WORSHIP TEAM REPORT - KELSEY LOGAN

The 9:15 Worship Service is tailored especially for families with children but is open to all people. The service is designed to give children the opportunity to learn about God and his Word through participatory worship, music, drama, and stories, presented in a creative and non-threatening environment. The 9:15 Worship Committee's focus is to continually evolve the service for parish needs. We meet every 1-2 months and are excited to have 3 new team members join in 2022. We are grateful for the new voices Molly McHenry, Kerrie Yates, and Clairice Galey give to our team! Sally and JJ Engelbert, Allison English, Janet Keller, Helene Ault. and Kelsey Logan are veteran members of the team.

Major successes for 2022:

- We adjusted our service to make room for a processional of the cross, led by the children (and young at heart) of the church.
- We adapted to an earlier Godly Plan start time and Community Hour needs. A major triumph was strategy for 'coffee hour snack saving' so children going to Godly Play don't miss out on the treats.
- Multiple new families joined the service, with many new children.
- New visitor welcome packages were added for weekly distribution at the service.
- Our budget supported purchase of the 2 beautiful new paver candles now in use by the Torchbearers.
- We purchased a new computer for the service.
- Janet Keller repurposed several hand-me-down chasubles to create new altar hangings.
- While we anticipated hiring a musician for the service, in 2022, our search for this person will continue in 2023.

ALTAR GUILD - SHIRLEY ADAMS AND JANET KELLER

During 2022, the Altar Guild continued to ready the church on Sundays for each of the three services, in addition to special events that take place throughout the year.

In 2022, Altar Guild assisted with 4 funerals, 2 Confirmations, 2 weddings and 6 baptisms. Lent and Advent are our busy times. Beginning with Palm Sunday, Holy Week involves our entire team working behind the scenes as we prepare for Easter Sunday. The sanctuary flowers and the flowering cross are outward examples of the Altar Guild's work to make the season come alive for Calvary parishioners. During Advent and Christmas, Altar Guild's efforts revolve around ensuring that the church reflects a most holy and beautiful memory for us all. This year, the Stewardship committee utilized altar candle stubs to make the Amaryllis gifts for our congregation. We repurposed some of unused chasubles into altar cloths and hangings for the family service. Altar Guild purchased over a dozen new Acolyte Robes for that growing ministry.

ADULT EDUCATION

We were intentional this year about offering a number of times and places (in person and virtual) to engage Adult Education in 2022.

LENTEN SERIES

We offered a Zoom Lenten Series due to the pandemic, reading together [Eight Habits of Love: Overcome Fear and Transform Your Life](#) by the Reverend Ed Bacon.

CALVARY COMMUNITY HOUR

The 10:00 Hour has become a time for adults to learn in tandem with the Youth and Godly Play students. This past year we offered weekly explorations, including the Calvary Cares Series (*featuring Jeff Neyrose from Spring Grove Cemetery and parishioner Chip Skidmore*), a Creation Care series (*led by the Rev. Susan Smith and Sherman Smith*), and lessons in Scripture and Christian Tradition (*led by the Rector*).

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

The Education for Ministry Program expanded this year to include three new members, for a total of 11 participants. This four-year certificate program offers theological education based upon small-group study and practice. This past year, the cohort explored, "Living Faithfully in Our World" and "Living Faithfully in a Multicultural World."

CONFIRMATION PREPARATION

Kerrie Yates and Sophie Longley were confirmed by the Right Reverend Wayne Smith. Sherman Smith formally reaffirmed his faith. All participated in study and preparation for the Confirmation rite in Calvary Community Hour.



CHOIR & MUSIC

HOWARD HELVEY, ORGANIST/CHOIRMASTER

CHOIR

In January 2022 the Choir was amid its first season of relative normalcy following many Covid-pandemic months of not singing together. Seventeen choristers were on the roster, and weekly participation involved 12-15 singers on average. Although there were losses (due to health, geographic move, etc.), the Choir gained several new skilled volunteers, and began the Fall 2022 season with four outstanding Choral Scholars. As continued from 2021, no Organ Scholar was placed during 2022.

CHOIR LIBRARY

Thanks in part to the *Sanborn Family Fund*, the Choir library was expanded with the purchase of several choral anthems, anthologies, and recordings. As always, effort was made to acquire music with a “long shelf-life,” hopefully with enduring relevance for future generations.

LITURGY/MUSIC & CONCERT HIGHLIGHTS

Highlights included: Good Friday Liturgy, with violinist/violist Satish Casie Chetty (April 15); The Winton Woods High School Varsity Ensemble joined CFE for a portion of the concerts on April 15 and Nov. 16. The Sandy Sanborn Martin Memorial Concert, Duruflé *Requiem* performed by the Cincinnati Fusion Ensemble with internationally-renowned guest organist Isabelle Demers (April 24); Gaslight Chamber Music Series with members and guests of CFE (July 22-23); The Mary Slade Rust Martin and Louis Henry Martin Memorial Concert performed by CFE with the return of organist Isabelle Demers (Nov. 16); The 43rd Annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols (Dec. 11).

CHOIR & MUSIC

INSTRUMENTS

Regular maintenance was applied to the organ, and logistics of restoring or (more likely) replacing its massive original 1927 blower motor continued. Especially in the absence of an Organ Scholar, the organ's sophisticated recorder/sequencer feature proved particularly helpful. The chancel Steinway piano received significant improvements to its internal action (executed by master technician Nevin Essex during the autumn).

COMMISSIONED WORKS

To help celebrate in 2019 the installation of the Rev. Allison English as Calvary's 19th Rector, the parish commissioned the anthem, *Lift up your hearts*, by Dr. Mack Wilberg (Music Director of the Tabernacle Choir at Temple Square). A fully-orchestrated version of the anthem was featured on the March 20, 2022 world-wide broadcast/episode of *Music and the Spoken Word* from Salt Lake City, which was heard and seen by millions of people; to date, the YouTube archive of the program has reached nearly 100,000 views.

Reflecting on Calvary's Vision and Mission Statements, Dr. Mary Louise Bringle (Brevard College, NC) created a commissioned hymn text, *Because God first loved us*. I composed a new tune, *KARBERS RIDGE*, to carry the text, and the congregation sang it for the first time on Calvary's Feast Day, Holy Cross (Sept. 11).

On Nov. 20 the Calvary Choir premiered the commissioned anthem, *Sing praise to God*, by Dr. Ryan Murphy (Associate Music Director of the Tabernacle Choir at Temple Square).

2023 OUTLOOK

For twelve weeks beginning in early May, I'm grateful for the opportunity to take a sabbatical leave. During my time away, Mitchell Miller will serve as interim Organist/Choirmaster.

OUTREACH

Many churches have experienced a shift in their outreach ministries as they begin to re-emerge from COVID. *Calvary is no different.* Where new energy has fueled ministries such as Laundry Love, The Brood, and the Cincinnati Sanctuary Congregation Coalition, other ministries such as Habitat for Humanity and IHN/Found House have struggled to stay afloat given shifts in volunteer interest and availability. 2022 was a year of gathering data about these shifts, and 2023 will be a time to prayerfully discern "next steps."

Some highlights from the year:

Creating meaningful relationships with dozens of low and no-income households at **Laundry Love**. Sharing and receiving God's love through the simple task of washing clothes, and reminding our neighbors of their inherent dignity and worth.

Serving eleven home-cooked meals to mentally ill individuals at **Tender Mercies**. New volunteers have stepped up to serve, and we enjoy getting to know each other and our neighbors in a deeper way through this service opportunity.

Deepening in relationship with **St. Andrew's Food Pantry**. We were able to donate a new refrigerator and chest freezer in honor of Anne and Tate Greenwald, and at Thanksgiving we donated 50+ bags of food and hygiene supplies put together at our "Families Give Thanks" event.

Welcoming a new refugee family from Ghana as part of the **Cincinnati Sanctuary Congregation Coalition**. Calvary parishioners help to acclimate the family, transport them to the grocery and medical and legal appointments. New volunteers are welcome!

Other notable outreach events included our donation of 30 gifts to the **Lighthouse Youth** Christmas program, our continued support of **El Hogar** and **Caracole**, and involving the youth group in discernment around allocating outreach funds.

PASTORAL CARE

Calvary saw an increase in pastoral care needs in the past year, with many parishioners undergoing major surgeries and treatments, going through life transitions or crises, and seeking pastoral guidance and referrals for further support.

Calvary also saw a major increase in homebound parishioners in 2022.

EUCCHARISTIC VISITORS

Due to the spike in homebound parishioners and increased pastoral need, the Rector re-invigorated the Eucharistic Visiting Ministry, including both lay and ordained members Cindy Bourgeois, the Rev. Olivia Hamilton, the Rev. Bob Moore, Jane Paraskevopoulos, the Rt. Rev. Nedi Rivera, and Bob Smith. We made an average of two home visits a week in 2022.

CALLING MINISTRY

Shirley Adams had a major injury herself, breaking her femur and spending a good deal of time in hospital and rehabilitation. As she recovered, the Rector blessed her initiation of a calling ministry. Shirley faithfully phoned several other homebound parishioners throughout her recovery.



CHILDREN & FAMILY MINISTRIES

Sally Engelbert, Family and Children's Minister

CHILDREN'S EDUCATION

2022 was a year of getting back to familiar ways of doing things. With the help of 8 regular volunteers in the Sunday School rooms and more helping with Summer Stories, we provided education opportunities for pre-K through 6th grade children year round.

GODLY PLAY

Godly Play was our Sunday School program from January through April and again from September through December. The Godly Play program:

- ran for 28 weeks
- told 56 separate stories between the three classes
- added saints of more diverse backgrounds to our All Saints' lesson
- engaged 30 children in exploring the stories of Christian faith and tradition

SUMMER STORIES

The Summer Stories program ran from June through August during the 9:15 service. All children attending the service participated. Summer stories:

- ran for 12 weeks
- provided opportunities to explore themes connecting the lectionary to children's books

FAMILY MINISTRIES

Family Events were able to resume in the Spring of 2022 and we have really enjoyed being able to share space and food with each other again in our programming. We started our offerings with outdoor events and moved indoors as we were able later on in the year. These events run smoothly thanks to many volunteers. This year we were also able to expand our audience for some of these events thanks to connections with the Brood and Kids4Peace. Throughout the year we connected over 25 families with programming. Offerings for 2022 included:

- Easter Egg Hunt
- Movie Night
- Krohn Conservatory Prismatic Exhibit
- Families Giving Thanks
- Advent Wreath Making

THE BROOD

The Brood is Calvary's ministry to foster, adoptive, and kinship families in the Cincinnati area, headed up by our Curate, the Rev. Olivia Hamilton. In 2022, The Brood engaged around thirty diverse families. Some members of The Brood have even chosen to make Calvary their church home.

Highlights from the year include:

- Being the recipient of a \$30k multi-year grant from the Diocese's "Committee on Congregational Life" that will help The Brood to expand and reach more families.
- Gathering 12 foster, adoptive, and kinship parents for an Advent Quiet Day led by spiritual director Natasha Burrowes (event pictured below).
- Collaborating with local organization La Soupe for an improv cooking class for six foster/adoptive youth and their caregivers.
- Gathering over a dozen times, in person and on Zoom, to pray together and support one another. Learning from experts in the field such as Fernside Center for Grieving Children and Encompass Adoptees, how best to support the youth in our care.
- Celebrating three adoptions within three separate Brood families!





BECOMING BELOVED COMMUNITY

In recognition of the milestones and missteps of our past, and with a sense of hope for our future, Calvary has been intentional about regularly exploring the continuing realities of racism in our community, and has made a vested effort to get involved in the Episcopal Church's formal "Becoming Beloved Community" work.

The Sesquicentennial Celebration of the Diocese of Southern Ohio is coming up soon. Bishop Wayne Smith has called upon parishes to join in the Becoming Beloved Community four-fold spiritual path as a vital part of this celebration. This path includes:

- **Telling the Truth**
- **Practicing the Way of Love**
- **Proclaiming the Dream**
- **Repairing the Breach**

The first part of this spiritual journey is **Telling the Truth**. Bishop Smith called upon each parish in the diocese to submit a roughly 1200 word document that explores the history of race relations in our church life.

Vestry Members **Kelsey Logan** and **Megan Rich**, along with the **Reverend Olivia Hamilton**, completed this submission using primary sources available to them. On Sunday, January 15th, the document was shared with the parish.

We will continue the vital work of **Telling the Truth** in Black History Month as we welcome **Bekky Baker** from the **Intercommunity Justice and Peace Center**, who will present a three-part docuseries on Race and Racism in Cincinnati. This series is open to the neighborhood and featured in the **Clifton Chronicle** this quarter.

CALVARY 2023 BUDGET COMMENTS

Robert Smith, Calvary Treasurer

Calvary continues to operate in a strong financial position due to both your giving and the gifts from previous parishioners. Below is a brief overview of 2022 financial results and 2023 budget. The 2022 spending came in under budget by about \$18,000 despite our failure to budget for an \$18,000 Diocesan Assessment carried over from underpayment in 2021. We are not making that mistake this year. The Clergy, Vestry and Staff did an excellent job of finding savings through better management of hours and type of work done by staff, in our cleaning contract, in office equipment leasing, upgrade and replacement, and facilities maintenance/improvement. Most of the deferred maintenance items have been done which has reduced Facilities costs.

Actual 2022 Revenue was very close to budgeted, except for an overestimate of early payments of 2023 pledges.

The Budget for 2023 is lower by \$35,000 despite payroll increases to keep pace with inflation. The major reason for this is the success in our clergy in securing grants. Currently the Diocese has and will give us \$45,000 to support program and staff cost for Brood and a \$10,000 Creation Care grant to insulate Calvary House. Our Facilities costs are budgeted to be \$90,000 lower this year as the maintenance is "ordinary" rather than emergency. Also, the Creation Care funding helps.

Our invested funds suffered a 17% loss in 2023. The annual return from inception was 5.9%. The von Goeben bequest filled in for that loss, so our fund value finished at \$5,958,000 compared to \$6,472,000 at the beginning of 2022. Throughout 2022, \$415,000 was withdrawn from the fund.
